Aloha!

As the FY 2020/21 comes to an end, I would like to take this time to announce plans for FY 2021/22. Understand these are ONLY plans, and that nothing is written in stone and no one is obligated to participate unless of their own free will.

I have been following a young lady on Facebook who was diagnosed with osteosarcoma, a very rare form of bone cancer, in January of 2018. In April of 2018, she underwent a 15 hour limb salvage surgery to remove the tumor growing in her left femur. On April 23rd of this year, she underwent a second 6 hour bone salvage surgery, to remove a second tumor....she is 15 years old, and has inspired me to start a Pediatric Cancer campaign in the 2021/22 fiscal year. In the near future, I will introduce you all to this young powerhouse of inspiration. Meanwhile, here is a summary of what we have been organizing in the past few months.

- •I have been in contact with Donna Witsell, the Executive Director of the Hawaii Children's Cancer Foundation. We are in discussions on how our club might partner with them. When our talks are completed, I will invite her to present our partnership to the club. This will essentially be Leo projects, and will not require a club vote.
- •Lion Shasta Yamada, has introduced a few of our club members to another young lady who is HUGE in the Youth Community Service circle. She and her youth group of friends have been planning, organizing and executing service projects for the last 6 years. On top of the list of charitable projects that they already do, they will also assist with the Pediatric Cancer campaign.... The young lady who formed this group is 13 years old. Keep in mind that these plans do NOT exclude the Kaimuki Leos from participating.
- •This young philanthropist and her mother have agreed to become members. Her mother will become a member of the
